

Key Vocabulary	Definition			
5 Fingers	Islam, Muslims, Qur'an, Arabic, Mosque			
Ramadan	Ramadan is the ninth month of the Islamic calendar, when Muslims fast during daylight hours.			
Eid (al-Fitr)	This festival marks the end of Ramadan (the Muslim holy month of fasting). It is a time of official receptions and parties, when friends geet each other, presents are given, new clothes worn and graves of relatives are visited. Large feasts help Muslims celebrate.			
Halal	Meaning permissible or lawful. Refers to an animal or its meat slaughtered or prepared in the manner perscribed by Islamic law.			
Haram	Refers to any act that is forbidden by Allah. Muslims believe that follow these define the morality of human action.			
Madrasah	A school or college, especially a shcool attached to a mosque where young men study theology.			
Ummah	Arabic word meaniing 'community'.Refers to the whole of Islam,each member bound to all the others by the special religious ties from which they find meaning.			
Akhlaq	Refers to the ethics, good conduct and moral character of a person 'The only reason why I am sent is to perfect good Akhlaq.'			
Islamophobia	Fear, hatred of or prejudice against the Islamic religion or Muslims generally.			


Our End Points:

5 Fingers	Christianity, Christian, Bible, Hebrew, Aramaic, Greek, Church		
Worship	Love or devotion shown to a being or an object considered sacred.		
Prayer	A form of worship that praises, requests or gives thanks to God or some other holy thing.		
Community	A group of people living in the same place or having a particular characteristic or interest in common		
Denomination	A religious group that has slightly different beliefs from other groups that share the same religion.		
Ceremony	A formal religious or public occasion, done in a particular way, to celebrate a particular event, achievement or anniversary.		
Humanism	A belief system based on the principle that people's spiritual and emotional needs can be satisified without following a god or religion.

Expected: I can explain key features of worship and what worship means to a believer. I can explore the role of community for a Christian and a Humanist.


HOW DO SIKHS WORSHIP?



Key Vocabulary	Definition			
5 Fingers	Sikhism, Sikh, Guru Granth Sahib, Punjabi, Gurmukhi, Gurdwara			
Gurdwara	A Sikh place of worship/ holy building.			
Guru	A Hindu spiritual teacher.			
Guru Granth Sahib	The Guru Granth Sahib, also called Adi Granth, is the holy book of the religion Sikhism.			
Khanda	The symbol or emblem of Sikhism is known as the Khanda. It is made up of – a double edged sword. This represents the belief in one God.			
Punjabi	Belonging or relating to the Punjab region of India or Pakistan, it's people or it's language. Punjabi is the language spoken in the Punjab.			
Gurmukhi	The script used to write the sayings of the Gurus and used to write the Punjabi language.			
Langar	Free community kitchen in the Gurdwara for all visitors.			
Pilgrimage	A journey to a special place that has religious or spiritual significance			
Rituals	A religious or solemn ceremony consisting of a series of actions performed according to a prescribed order.			
Golden Temple	The holiest shrine of Sikhs also called the Harimandir. It is situated in the Punjab state.			

Our End Points:

Emerging: Can explain that the Gurdwara is the place of worship for Sikhism and can offer suggestions for what may happen here.

Expected: Can tell you about the similar aspects of a Gurdwara and about how Sikhs worship and share food at the Langar.

Exceeding: Confident when discussing the Sikh belief using correct terms. Can discuss the purpose of the Gurdwara and how this shows community.



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Key Vocabulary	Definition			
5 Fingers	Christianity, Christian, Bible, Hebrew, Aramaic, Greek, Church			
Denomination	A recognised branch of the Church which may have beliefs and practices slightly different to another branch. Anglican, Catholic, Non-Conformist.			
Eucharist	A ceremony or service in Christian Churches which remembers the wine and the bread at the Last Supper. Also known as Communion.			
Koinonia	Greek word for fellowship. A group of people with similar beliefs of interests. Fellowship is important for Christians.			
Liturgy	This is the order which an act of Christian worship may follow. May include responses, prayers, hymns, teaching, readings etc.			
Resurrection	The Christian belief of Jesus rising from the dead.			
Salvation	Christians believe that Salvation is a gift. When Jesus died their sins were forgiven. Christians receive eternal life as a gift from God.			
Saint	Someone who was canonised by the Catholic Church after their death for their Christian acts.			
Saint George	Died 23rd April 303. A soldier. Patron Saint of England. George and the Dragon. Flag of St George.			

Our End Points:

Emerging:. Can talk about differences and similarities within churches in their locality.

Expected: Pupils can compare churches within their locality with an example of one around the world. They can explain how key Christian beliefs can be found with worshippers nearby and far away.

Exceeding: Can discuss a global Christian community with shared beliefs and values alongside the importance of fellowship. Can compare differences and similarities in a range of acts of worship in different churches in different countries.
